I am writing in regard to the recent problems regarding the telemarketers making unwanted telephone calls to people's homes..


I strongly agree with the idea of having a registry for people who don't want telemarketers calling them or members of their families.


Dear Sirs/Madam:

We look forward to calls from friends and family. We rely on phones in case of emergency - In case of an accident it may be our only source of help. We pay for these services. For many seniors on a fixed income the phone bill may be a large budget item.

On an average day I receive three or four calls from telemarketers. Some of these calls are multiple calls. By the time you reach the phone the caller has disconnected. There are devices on the market that block some of these calls. Why should I have to buy one of these devices to block calls I shouldn't be receiving in the first place? I do not believe


Gentlemen:

More than 50% of current calls are "cold", occur particularly at or after dinner, often dialed by a computer with no one answering after pick-up, telling me I'm getting something "free" but turn out otherwise after a few pointed questions.

Seems as though one has to spend money to try and thwart these unwanted calls, the phone company offers other enhancements to further reduce this the onslaught each at an additional cost and all of which are treating a symptom but not offering a permanent cure.
